Dear People of Grace,

We have one month to think about it and plan it. I am talking about Lent this year. I don't know about you, but almost every year, Lent sneaks up on me. Christmas happens. Then, it's Epiphany. And all of sudden, it's Lent! Well, Beloved, this year Lent is not going to surprise us! No, we are going to be ready for it. Each of us is going to have a plan about how we are going to spend those forty days before Easter with Jesus, with our blessed Lord.

So, join me, beginning now, in making a personal plan for Lent. Of course, traditionally, we have thought about "giving something up" for Lent. The idea of giving something up for Lent is twofold, I suppose. One part has to do with making some kind of small personal sacrifice for Christ. Remembering that He sacrificed His life for us and for the sin of the world, we make some kind of token sacrifice for Him during those forty days. That token sacrifice might be something like giving up alcoholic beverages or sweets or coffee during the Lenten season.

In addition to being a sacrifice, whatever we give up is meant to be a prompt. For example, if it is sweets, then whenever we think of having something sweet, we let that be a prompt to give thanks to God or to pray for someone or to do something Christlike for someone. So, maybe you'd like to give up something for Lent this year.

More recently, I think, people have thought about "taking on something" for Lent, like reading a chapter from the Bible

each day and thinking about how it applies to your life. Or one might take on some kind of specific ministry during Lent like volunteering weekly for ABCCM or Manna Food Bank. One might take on some kind of course of study like holding a Lenten Bible Study in your home, or attending some sort of study course at church. Our Christian formation team, I'm sure, will

be offering some kind of study at Grace as a Lenten opportunity.

In recent years I have thought that whatever you do for Lent ought to bring you closer to Christ in some way. If giving up alcohol or chocolate or coffee is not going to bring you closer to Christ, then don't do it, because the object of being a Christian is following Jesus in our lives. Therefore, the object of any Lenten offering on our parts must be something that would help us follow Jesus more closely.

I had another thought this year in addition to the one in the previous paragraph. This year, it occurred to me that whatever you and I do during the Lenten season should bring us joy. Jesus said that He came that His joy would be in us and that our joy would be full or complete. So, I invite you to join me this year in thinking of a Lenten offering to God (that sounds better than "discipline," doesn't it?), a Lenten offering to and for Jesus that will bring us joy. My hunch is that whatever we might choose to do during Lent that brings us joy will also draw us closer to Jesus because He is our joy, right?



Safe Church Training, February 8

As Christians, we live in a covenant relationship with God and with each other. Through the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, we have entered a sacred covenant in which we have pledged to live lives that “seek and serve Christ in all persons” and to “respect the dignity of every human being.” As we look over the past couple of years and as Father Gary warns us each week, we are reminded that “it is a dangerous world out there.” We realize “that” world can intrude on “our” world at any given moment. The threat of violence and hatred are not the only emergencies that we can face as a congregation. Fire, a medical event, a missing person are a few others.

If you are like most worshippers, you might have little or no background in what to do when faced with an emergency. The first step in overcoming an emergency is to have some idea of what to do. While it is not our intent to turn the congregation of Grace into a bunch of Emergency Responders, Father Gary, Father Bob and I are working together to would like to raise a “Sense of Awareness.” We can no longer walk through the doors of Grace Church and think “it can’t happen here.” Father Gary, Father Bob and I have worked on a training program that addresses these types of situations that we may face at Grace. We have introduced this program to the Ushers, who are in a position to serve as our “first line.” We will be offering the same program again on February 8 at 7:00 p.m. at the church. You don’t need to have any kind of training to attend. This information is open for anybody. If you have medical training all the better. We would love to see you there. If you should have concerns or questions, please feel free to contact me. I look forward to seeing you.

Discovering Lent

If you're like me, you learn new things about Lent every year. Here, from a previous TEAM issue, is a reprint of some Lenten trivia you may find interesting:

Why do Episcopalians observe Lent?

Lent is a solemn observance in the liturgical year of many Christian denominations, including the Episcopal Church. Probably originating in the fourth century of the Church, it is one of the oldest observances in the Christian calendar. Its traditional purpose was the preparation of catechumens through prayer, penance, repentance, almsgiving and self-denial for baptism and acceptance into the Church. Today, often through a variety of Lenten disciplines, Christians continue to use the period of time leading up to Easter for introspection, self-examination, repentance and good works.

What does the word “Lent” mean?

The word “Lent” is derived from the Anglo-Saxon words “lencten” meaning “spring” and “lenctentid,” which means both “Springtide” and “March.”

Why do some traditions refer to Lent as the Bright Sadness?

Because Lent is observed as a season of sorrowful reflection, it is called in Eastern Orthodox traditions the season of Bright Sadness.

When does Lent occur?

In most western traditions, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes either on Maundy Thursday morning or on Easter Eve. At Grace, Lent is observed from Ash Wednesday (March 1) until sundown on Holy Saturday (April 15). Sundays are not counted in the forty days of Lent.

What is the significance of keeping the Lenten fast for forty days?

The number forty is connected with many biblical events: forty days and forty nights of rain in the story of Noah and the ark; the forty days and forty nights Moses spent on Mount Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments; the forty years the Israelites spent in the desert. The number is particularly significant for Christians during Lent because it is a time of spiritual preparation mirroring the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry.

What is carnival?

More than just a big indulgent party in places like New Orleans or Rio de Janeiro, carnival is the three-day period preceding the beginning of Lent — the Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday immediately before Ash Wednesday (some traditions consider carnival to be the entire period of time between Epiphany and Ash Wednesday). The word “carnival” is derived from the Latin phrase “carne vale” which means “farewell to meat.”

What is Clean Monday?

Also known as Ash Monday, Clean Monday is the first day of Lent in the Eastern Orthodox Christian tradition. Clean Monday refers to the leaving behind of sinful attitudes and it is often commemorated by giving one’s house a thorough cleaning. Kite-flying is another widespread custom for Clean Monday.

What does “Mardi Gras” mean?

“Mardi Gras” is French for “Fat Tuesday.” It was traditionally the day when people emptied their pantries of food items restricted during Lent. Today the phrase is often used to refer to the entire three-day period prior to the beginning of Lent. In some parts of the Christian world, the commonly-used term for the Tuesday before Lent is Shrove Tuesday. To “shrive” means to present oneself for confession, penance and absolution.

Why eat pancakes on Fat Tuesday?

Pancakes are made using fat, milk and eggs, foods that were traditionally restricted during Lent. Thrifty homemakers would make pancakes on Fat Tuesday to empty their pantries of those items. The day is also called Pancake Tuesday.

Where do the ashes for Ash Wednesday come from?

The ashes for Ash Wednesday are typically gathered from the burning of palm fronds from the previous year’s Palm Sunday.

Why make pretzels in Lent?

Around the year 610 (supposedly in preparation for Lent) a monk was using unleavened bread to make a treat for children who had learned to recite their prayers. Christians in those days prayed by folding their hands across their chests with each hand touching the opposite shoulder. The clever monk twisted strips of dough to look like hands folded in prayer. He gave his creation the name “pretiola,” Latin for “little reward.”


We therefore assert and we believe that “the Episcopal Church welcomes you” – all of you, not as merely a church slogan, but as a reflection of what we believe Jesus teaches us and at the core of the movement he began in the first century. The Episcopal Church welcomes all. All of us!

As the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement today, we Episcopalians are committed, as our Prayer Book teaches to honor the covenant and promises we made in Holy Baptism: To proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ; To seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves; to strive for justice and peace among all people, and to respect the dignity of every human being.

As Christians, we believe that all humans are created in God’s image and equal before God – those who may be rejoicing as well as those who may be in sorrow.

As a Church, seeking to follow the way of Jesus, who taught us, “you shall love your neighbor as yourself,” (Mt. 22:39) and to “do to others as you would have them do to you” (Mt. 7:12), we maintain our longstanding commitment to support and welcome refugees and immigrants, and to stand with those who live in our midst without documentation. We reaffirm that like all people LGBT persons are entitled to full civil rights and protection under the law. We reaffirm and renew the principles of inclusion and the protection of the civil rights of all persons with disabilities. We commit to the honor and dignity of women and speak out against sexual or gender-based violence. We express solidarity with and honor the Indigenous Peoples of the world. We affirm the right to freedom of religious expression and vibrant presence of different religious communities, especially our Muslim sisters and brothers. We acknowledge our responsibility in stewardship of creation and all that God has given into our hands. We do so because God is the Creator. We are all God’s children, created equally in God’s image. And if we are God’s children we are all brothers and sisters.

“The Episcopal Church Welcomes You,” is not just a slogan, it’s who we seek to be and the witness we seek to make, following the way of Jesus.



Becoming An American - Congrats, Valerie!



Our own Valerie Heavens became a U.S. citizen on December 29, in Charlotte, NC. She shares below some thoughts about the process and her new country.

You may wonder what brought me from Canada to the USA? I met my American husband at a two week spiritual retreat outside of Toronto in the summer of ’93, and six months later, after my fiancé visa was approved, we were married. We started our life together in a little log cabin near Tuxedo, just outside of Hendersonville, NC. It seemed I was always too busy to apply for citizenship, but in May, with my permanent residency card coming up for a third renewal, I decided to apply for citizenship. With all the things I learned during the process of studying for my exam, I wish I had done it much sooner.

I didn’t understand why there was so much gridlock in government. As I learned about the checks and balances that are written into the Constitution and its amendments, I began to feel increasingly at peace during this tumultuous election season, trusting that nothing too radical is likely to happen that changes the fabric of the freedoms that we enjoy. It takes a lot of agreement between members of the Senate, House of Representatives and President to get a bill passed. In other words, no matter how enthusiastic someone might be about change, they can’t turn this big ship on a dime.

At the same time, I do understand that the balance can shift in the Supreme Court, and that interventions in the international community can have grave consequences. We have a leader who is keeping everyone on their toes. We have to stay awake. We can’t be lulled into just thinking along party lines. We need to think for ourselves, and I see more and more senators, house members and pundits questioning things and being willing to speak out. My hope is that we will keep moving in the direction of an evolving consciousness, where it is recognized that individuals have free choice as long as they are not infringing upon the free choices of others. Overall, I must say, that it feels good to be using the term “we!”

An open letter from Outreach Coordinator Sue Thompkins:

Dear Grace Parish Family and Vestry Members,

I want to let you know that the Grace Outreach Committee is undergoing a transformation and would like your input, support, and prayers as outreach changes. My husband and I have made the decision to move to the Seattle area to be closer to our daughter and her family. This is not a move that we are undertaking lightly, but it is one that we anticipate with much joy. Those of you who have grandchildren can understand the pull that the idea of being a more frequent person in their lives and the lives of their parents allows. Being three thousand miles away is difficult.

As I leave and as I have talked with members of the outreach committee, it is apparent that Grace is a church that prides itself on being an "outreach church." We have many active programs that are run by our outreach committee — Back Packer, Angel Tree, Back to School, food drives for ABCCM, building the Episcopal Habitat House, and coat drives for the homeless are a few that come to mind. In addition, our parish is pledged to give financial support on an annual basis to Room in the Inn, Consider Haiti, Habitat for Humanity, ABCCM, and ERD.

As I leave, Grace is faced with trying to decide how it wants to "do outreach" in the future. Here are some questions that I think both the parish members and the Vestry may want to consider as you move forward.

1. Do you want to try to continue all the programs we are doing now, but with some new volunteers? Are you willing to volunteer?
2. Do you want to focus on a smaller number of programs? If so, what are they and who will do them? What should we keep and what do we need to let go?
3. Is there someone who is willing to write the checks and cover letters to the charitable organizations we have been supporting? This is not a difficult job, but one that

needs oversight.

4. Are there new areas of outreach that you would like to start? If so, who will manage them?

5. Should outreach activities be very focused and short term like a coat drive, or should they be long-term and ask for a longer time commitment, like our Back Packer program?

6. How does Grace as a parish want to define outreach: as making a one time commitment to a program, as making a longer term time commitment to a program, as giving money but not time, or are there other ways?

7. Should you, as a parish, let the outreach committee as it exists now phase out? Or can we move forward in a new way?

8. Do you have other thoughts or suggestions?

These are not questions for me to ponder but for you, the parish and Vestry, to struggle with as you move forward. I am thankful and grateful for my experiences here at Grace and am asking for your prayers as I move forward in my search for a new parish home. You will all be missed and I am grateful for the opportunity to have been a part of the Grace parish family and to have had the pleasure of helping with Outreach while I have been here.

Pastoral Care

FRIENDS IN CHRIST: “Christ has no body now on earth but yours, no hands but yours, no feet but yours. Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world.” – St. Teresa of Avila

In every faith community, there are parishioners who, for various reasons, are no longer able to participate in the life of the church. Dr. Virginia T. Monroe, a priest, has developed a ministry to reach out to these folks, which she has called “Friends in Christ.” We have adopted that program here at Grace. The link to the parish with our homebound friends is accomplished through brief visits as well as an occasional handwritten note or a phone call. This is a ministry of presence whereby a lay person commits to make a brief thirty-minute, pre-arranged monthly visit for a year. This “Friend in Christ” comes in the name of Christ on behalf of our Parish, as a friend, not as one who will counsel, solve problems, and do tasks or errands for the parishioner. The role of a Friend is just that — to be a friend. We have been relatively successful at Grace because six of you have made the commitment to visit eight of our eleven homebound parishioners. If you have small children in your home, you are encouraged to consider this ministry. Our homebound friends do not get to visit with many children and the blessings you receive will far surpass the time you spend. We are hopeful that, if you have not yet found your ministry at Grace, you will consider making a commitment to becoming a Friend for a year. Training will be provided by Jarod Coffey, a social worker in our parish, later in the year. Please call Kathleen Griffin at 337-8241 if you have any questions.

FEED MY SHEEP: This ministry, under the coordination of Jennifer Clary and Cheryl Deyton, continues to flourish by providing soup to those who are ill or may appreciate an occasional meal. Call Jennifer or Cheryl if you have questions, would like soup or want to help.

Pledge receipts through the end of December totaled \$346,128 compared to projected pledges of \$329,000. Considering all income sources, income received for the year totaled \$430,628, while we projected income to be \$402,453. We ended the year with a positive income variance of \$28,175. Excluding a large donation received early in the year, we still experienced a positive trend in overall income.

The positive income variance thus far was reduced somewhat by expenses which were greater than budgeted amounts by \$5849. When subtracted from the positive income variance of \$28,175 our income less expenses resulted in a still healthy surplus of \$22,326 at year-end.

Once final adjustments are made to year end balances, the surplus will be transferred to our capital reserve account for future needs.

While we ended the year in a very positive position, we do need to be aware that a single donation has greatly influenced our financial position. We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.
