Dear People of God,

I want to talk to you in this "Parson to Person" about Holy Week and Easter and, particularly, the worship opportunities that will be available to us and about honoring our Lord Jesus with our presence in worship.

Of course, Holy Week begins with the celebration of Palm Sunday, March 20, with all its pomp and glory. The reading from the Gospel tells the story of Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem as people wave their palm branches in celebration of the coming of their King. They proclaim Him as the Son of David, which is a Messianic title. The celebratory nature of the service quickly deteriorates, however, continuing with the passion and death of our Lord as we read our parts in the Passion Narrative.

On Wednesday, March 23, we will celebrate the Holy Eucharist at 12:15 p.m. in the nave. We will use the readings for the days of Holy Week for this service. Hopefully, some of you will be able to get loose from work to join us for this brief thirty minute midday service.

On Maundy Thursday, March 24, at 6:00 p.m., we celebrate the night in which Jesus instituted The Holy Eucharist as He shared the bread and cup with His disciples. We will also have the washing of each other's hands (or feet) as we remember Jesus lovingly washing the feet of his disciples.

On Good Friday, March 25, we will have the Liturgy for Good Friday at 12:00 noon and again at 6:00 p.m. at which we will commemorate and mourn the death of

our Lord on the Cross.

On Holy Saturday, March 26, at 10:00 a.m. in the Memorial Garden, we will remember all of those who have been interred there. This occurs during the time when Jesus lay in the tomb before His resurrection.

Also on Saturday, at 5:30 p.m., we will have an Easter Vigil Service culminating in the first Easter Eucharist.

On Easter Sunday, worship will be held at the regular times of 7:45 a.m., 9:00 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. An Easter egg hunt for children will follow the 9:00 a.m. service.

The pilgrimage in Holy Week is the last leg of our Lenten journey. What if, as

part of your Lenten discipline, you were to plan, with Jesus, the services during Holy Week that would be life giving for you to attend? Why not take some quiet time right now to plan your Holy Week worship? If worship is something you naturally enjoy, your Holy Week worship plan will be a treat to look forward to. If worship is something you don't naturally enjoy, it will be a sacrifice offered to Jesus out of your love for Him. In either case, Jesus will be honored by your presence.

Lenten Class on Forgiveness Continues

Our Lenten class on Forgiveness continues Thursday evenings, 6:30-8:00, through March 17.

We can probably all agree that forgiving someone who has wronged us or hurt us in some way is difficult. And yet, we know forgiveness is at the very heart of the Gospel. Fr. Gary, the facilitator for this class, learned a lot about how to forgive and live in love when he was away for a week of continuing education recently and hopes to share that learning with you during the Lenten season. Some of the things explored in the class include adjusting our image of God, letting go of resentment, forgiving others and forgiving ourselves. See the course description below.

How to Forgive and Live in Love

If you are tired of living in a world that:

- Is saturated by resentment
- Places a huge value on revenge
- Confuses revenge and punishment with justice
- Doesn't know how to find the freedom of forgiveness

"Jesus told us we need to forgive but he never taught us how." - Steve Andreas

The reason people don't forgive is simple:

- They don't know what forgiveness really is;

- They confuse it with reconciliation or forgetting;
- They don't know how to forgive;
- Something inside of them resists the idea of forgiving.

The solution is also simple:

- Teach people what forgiveness really is and what it is not;
- Teach people how to forgive;
- Resolve the internal resistance, which often occurs naturally when they learn what forgiveness really is and what it is not.

Our own Kim Hayes has graciously agreed to work for us during the interim period until we can get someone trained and in place. Thank you, Kim!

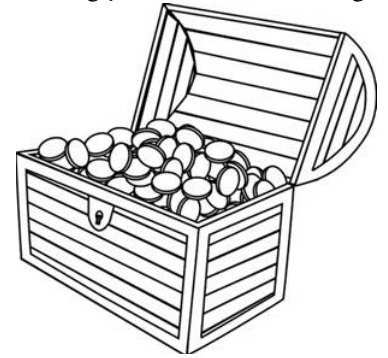

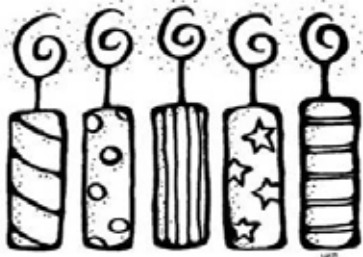

The Washing of Hands (and Feet)

Last year, as part of our Maundy Thursday worship, we experimented with changing the traditional washing of feet to the washing of hands. This was done in consideration of those of us who might be uneasy about having others touch their feet. Unlike Jewish culture in Jesus' time where washing the feet of a guest was considered an expression of hospitality, we are not so comfortable with it today. People now are far less sensitive about their hands than they are about their feet. There is, however, something admittedly special about the vulnerability of footwashing that gets lost in this switch to handwashing. Therefore, this year, while we will continue to include handwashing in the service, we will also add stations again for any who wish to have their feet washed instead.

Easter Traditions

The Triduum leads us into our Easter celebration.

The last week of Lent is called Holy Week, and it includes the days of the Easter Triduum, also called Holy Triduum, Paschal Triduum, or The Three Days. It is the period of three days that begins with the liturgy on the evening of Maundy Thursday and ends with evening prayer on Easter Sunday.

A moveable feast. For followers of Jesus in the Episcopal tradition, Easter, which celebrates our Lord's resurrection from the dead, is our most important holiday.

Often called a moveable feast because it doesn't fall on a set date every year, Easter is observed anytime between March 22 and April 25. Christian churches in the West celebrate Easter on the first Sunday following the full moon after the vernal equinox on March 21. Orthodox Christians use the Julian calendar to calculate when Easter will occur and typically celebrate the holiday a week or two after the Western churches, which follow the Gregorian calendar.

Where the name "Easter" originated. It is believed Easter derives its name from Eostre, an Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring. A month corresponding to April had been named "Eostremonat," or Eostre's month, leading to "Easter" becoming applied to the Christian holiday that usually took place within it. Prior to that, the holiday had been called Pasch (Passover), which remains its name in most non-English languages.

It seems probable that, around the second century A.D., Christian missionaries seeking to convert the tribes of northern Europe noticed that the Christian holiday commemorating the resurrection of Jesus roughly coincided with the Teutonic springtime celebrations, which emphasized the triumph of life over death. Christian Easter gradually absorbed the traditional symbols.

About those Easter eggs. In Medieval Europe, eggs were forbidden during Lent. Eggs laid during that time were often boiled or otherwise preserved. Eggs were thus a mainstay of Easter meals and a prized Easter gift for children and servants.

In addition, eggs have been viewed as symbols of new life and fertility through the ages. It is believed that, for this reason, many ancient cultures, including the ancient Egyptians, Persians, and Romans, used eggs during their spring festivals.

Easter lilies and hope. Sometimes called the "white-robed apostles of hope," it is said lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's agony. Tradition has it that the beautiful white lilies sprang up where drops of Christ's sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow and deep distress. Churches continue this tradition at Easter time by banking their altars and surrounding their crosses with masses of Easter lilies to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and hope of life everlasting.

"In your Easter bonnet, with all the frills upon it..." After their baptism, early Christians wore white robes throughout Easter week to symbolize their new lives. Those who had already been baptized wore new clothes as well to represent the life with Christ they shared with the newly baptised.

In Medieval Europe, churchgoers would take a walk after Easter Mass, led by a crucifix or the Easter candle. Today these walks endure as Easter parades. People show off their spring finery, including lovely bonnets decorated for spring.

Beyond Easter Sunday. Easter is followed by a fifty-day period called Eastertide, or the Easter Season, ending with Pentecost Sunday.
