Dear People of God,

I wonder if it is really true that we learn more from our mistakes and the hard times in life than from the times when our lives are going well. I suppose that it *is* true. When we are forced to overcome some kind of adversity, even if we just get through it, there is some relief that follows, isn't there? Also, there is the chance that we have learned something from the experience and that we have grown in some way.

The fourth and final lesson of Jesus associated with our meditation cards is **learning to see times of adversity or loss as learning opportunities rather than catastrophes**. Now, that does not mean that, when the tornado destroys our homes, we don't acknowledge and grieve the loss. No, we do not suggest that people live in denial about times of loss.

Modern psychology has shown us the importance of dealing with the realities of life. Denying them and repressing them can lead to psychological trauma. The question is, after we have acknowledged and taken the time to grieve the loss, can we look back at the experience as an opportunity to grow rather than simply as a catastrophe?

Can we look back at the catastrophe and see the many ways in which God was with us and helped during the experience, rather than feeling forsaken by God? Can we make the choice to trust God in the wake of catastrophe and tremendous loss? I am reminded of Job's statement after all

the losses he experienced. He trusted God enough to say, "Though he slay me, yet will I trust Him" (Job 13:15, KJV). In other words, Job said he would trust God no matter what should befall him in life.

A cynic would say someone who says that is only hedging his or her bets. That way, the cynic says, God can be the ultimate absentee landlord, doing nothing for us and yet expecting everything from us.

“Can we make the choice to trust God in the wake of catastrophe and tremendous loss?”

But there is another way to see things, and I believe that is the way in which Job saw them. Job said he would trust God no matter what because he knew God the way you know your very best friend or the person you have been closest to in your life. You *know* that person is trustworthy. Why would

we or Job say God is trustworthy? We would say it only if we believe what God has revealed to us, that He has prepared better things for us than we could ask for or imagine and that His love for us is completely boundless.

When we understand this, we know that, whatever catastrophe befalls us, not only did God not orchestrate it, but that God also weeps with us in it.

Sunday Classes for Adults

The Bible Study Class facilitated by Dr. Bill Dismukes meets in the library. The class has resumed a study of one of the major prophets, the Old Testament Book of Isaiah, and will examine the book of in its historical, cultural and Biblical contexts. Isaiah is the best known of the four major prophets, and the book contains many of the Old Testament Messianic prophecies. All are welcome as the class learns from the text and from one another's insights.

The Downstairs Class is reading the book *Sleeping With Bread*, by Matthew and Dennis Linn and Sheila Fabricant-Linn. The Linns bring their extensive Jesuit training to all their writings, combining the disciplines of psychology, theology and spirituality. *Sleeping With Bread* explores cultivating the spiritual practice of the examen to enrich the lives of children, families and individuals.

Someone once said that the unexamined life is not worth living. This book leads us to a simple way in which we, both adults and children, can learn to examine our lives daily. The practice enables us to be aware of our feelings about our daily lives and to see God's actions and graces on a daily basis.

The Pretty Good Coffee and Conversation Class meets in the parish hall. The class study is Brian McLaren's new book *Why Did Jesus, Moses, the Buddha and Mohammed Cross the Road?: Christian Identity in a Multi-Faith World*. When four religious leaders walk across the road, it's not the beginning of a joke. It's the start of one of the most important conversations in today's world. Can we be committed Christians without having to condemn or convert people of other faiths? Is it possible to affirm other religious traditions without watering down our own?

Widely-acclaimed author and speaker Brian McLaren proposes a new faith alternative, one built on "benevolence and solidarity rather than rivalry and hostility." That way of being Christian is strong, but it doesn't strong-arm anyone. It goes beyond mere tolerance to vigorous hospitality toward, interest in, and collaboration with others. Lyn Burkett and Monty Wooten are facilitators for the class.

The Angel Tree is up in the foyer! We are once again preparing for Christmas by purchasing gifts for foster children in Buncombe County who have been removed from their families of origin by the Courts because of abuse or neglect.

The stipends received by foster parents to care for these children are not large enough to include the purchase of gifts for Christmas. That's where we can step in and help. Each of the seventy-five angel decorations hanging on our tree has the name, age, grade and clothing sizes of a child, as well as a list of gifts for which the child has asked. Please remember, you do NOT need to purchase everything on the list. The items are "wishes" and the child will be happy to receive any of the items listed.

In the past, parish members have enjoyed shopping with friends to purchase the requested gifts. By partnering with someone to provide for an "angel," you can enjoy the camaraderie of shopping together and can help defray the expense.

Gifts are to be returned to the church no later than Sunday, December 15. The date is earlier than usual at the request of the Department of Social Services to assure that all presents are delivered to the foster homes before Christmas. You may wrap your gifts if you wish. If you wrap them, please label them. That way, the social workers and foster parents will know what is in each package. In addition, please be sure to return the angel decoration with the corresponding gifts to make sure they go to the child for whom you bought them. A Report from Convention

Ann Robinson and I had the privilege of being delegates from Grace Church at the 92nd Convention for our Episcopal Diocese, whose mission is to "Walk in the Way, Widen the Walls, and Wake Up the World." Bishop Taylor reminded us that there are sixty-four parishes that are each unique in their local realities, but we all have "One Lord, One Faith, and One Baptism."

Our Bishop, and the guest speaker, Bishop Sean Rowe, both stressed that the Episcopal Church is in a time of transition which can elicit fear, discord, and insularity. Both Bishops urged us, as The Church, to embrace connection, interdependence, and collective discernment, all undergirded by prayer. We were encouraged to let go of fear and to hold onto things lightly; to be involved in creative and civil conflict; to experiment – if something doesn't work, let it go and try another. Bishop Rowe said, "We have the product, Jesus Christ, that works 100% of the time", but we have not been able to sell it. He stressed the importance of good managers whose job is to take the visions of leaders and make them happen, after studying what the people in a community need. Bishop Taylor encouraged "kenosis", the emptying of self, in the interest of the other because we are all part of the whole.

"Our job for 2014 is CONNECTION," was the edict from our Bishop. Two exciting, available resources to make connections are *The Center for Spiritual Resources* which Robin Whittington created to provide information on programs and tools to help us use our spiritual gifts in God's work in the world. Another is *The City*, an internet site, managed by Chris Goldman, which is just for use within our Diocese for the purpose of providing information within ministries, of events, for prayer requests, and to generally be in contact as needed. Access these two via a web browser. The Convention resolutions and other information can also be accessed through the web.

The experience was enhanced by the presence of some of our active Diocesan youth who supplied music, reflections, a sermon, and participated in worship in multiple ways. Some of the members of Canterbury at UNCA served as acolytes. It was also made special by singing some of the liturgy and hymns in both Spanish and English.

Bishop Taylor reflected that "Christianity is always a movement – a pilgrimage – a journey." Let us journey together in His power and love.

An October Slow-Down

October pledges of \$27,542 fell \$2458 short of the \$30,000 budget. That negative variance when combined with other October offerings of \$4743 brought total contributions for October to \$32,286 with a target of \$35,240. All other income sources of \$1811 resulted in October income of \$34,097 and when compared to the month's budget of \$37,219 resulted in a negative variance of \$3121. Year-to-date pledges received total \$298,279 and are under our \$300,000 budget by \$1721. Other year-to-date offerings of \$53,615 result in year-to-date total general contributions of \$351,894 or \$501 under the budget of \$352,395. When combined with all other income, the year-to-date income at the close of the first ten months from all sources totals \$367,120 and falls short of budgeted income of \$372,187 by \$5067.

October Expenses totaled \$35,282 and were \$1936 under budget. That positive variance when combined with the negative income variance of \$3,121 resulted in an operating deficit of \$1,185 for the month. Year-to-date expenses of \$355,114 are \$17,073 under budget because of the timing of remaining budgeted needs that will be met in November and December. The \$5067 shortfall in year-to-date income reduces the \$17,073 positive variance in year-to-date expenses to an operating surplus of \$12,006.

Budgeted expenses left to be paid in the remaining two months of the year total \$74,437. It is our continued prayer that offerings will meet those needs.
