The air is getting crisp, the leaves are falling, and as always, time is flying! Advent began Sunday, November 30, and the challenge to remain centered in God during the busy-ness of this season is upon us once again.

It will be important for us to block out time for our spiritual disciplines of prayer and worship and reflection. The daily readings in *Forward Day by Day* will be helpful in this regard. Lighting the candles of our family Advent wreaths each evening at our dinner tables and praying our Advent prayers at home will be another way.

We are shifting the day and time of our weekly Taizé Advent Eucharist to Wednesdays at 5:30 with the hope that this earlier time will allow folks to come by the church on their way home from work and make these quiet reflective services part of their Advent offerings to God. Also, rather than having a homily, we will have a brief silence after each reading. What this means is that the service will take about thirty minutes. We hope that the earlier time and the brevity of this service will make it possible for you to join in these special Advent services.

Also, please know that our beloved children are most welcome at this service. They will like the church lit primarily with candles and the opportunity to

light a candle as they come up to receive communion. The beautiful repetitive chants will also be something they can join in singing with us. If you can possibly block out the time, this service is an opportunity to enrich your Advent as a family. In fact,

this service could serve as your "table worship" for Wednesdays each week.

We just spent the month of October thinking of our financial giving to God as a spiritual practice. These ideas of devotional readings, prayers around our family Advent wreaths, and Advent worship opportunities constitute our Advent spiritual practices. They are all about quietly waiting for the celebration of His first Advent on December 25, when He was laid in a manger in a stable. They are also about waiting for His Second Advent, when He will come to gather us to be with Him

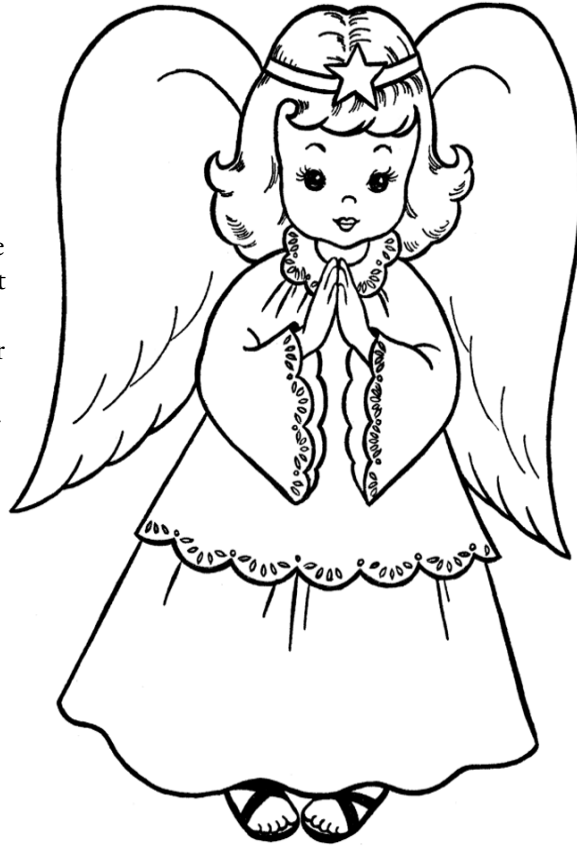
Grace Outreach

The Angel Tree is once again set up in the foyer thanks to the efforts of Monty Wooten and Cheryl Deyton. This year, the names of the children who are in need of presents are being provided to us by Caring for Children and the Foster Parents Association. Many but not all of these children have been removed from their homes by the courts and are in the custody of the Department of Social Services. None of these children are now living with their families. The children in both the Family Foster Care and Therapeutic Foster Care programs are in long-term placements and usually have little or no contact with their families. Children in the PERCS foster care program have been removed from their families and are awaiting long term placement. PERCS is an emergency program.

As in years past, please remember that you do not need

to purchase every item on the list. These are “wishes.” We also encourage you to partner with friends or



co-workers to provide gifts. Sue Thompkins is willing to shop for you if you are unable to do so. However, she must do it early this year, so please call her NOW at 828-230-9328 if you want her to assist you. Make a check out to Grace Episcopal Church and put Angel Tree on the memo line; then tell Sue how much you want her to spend. If you cannot take an angel but would like to help, purchase a gift, place it under the tree, and we will get it to a needy child. If you wrap your gifts, please label each one so the foster parent will know what is in the package. Please return your “angel” (the ornament you took from the Angel Tree) with the presents. WHY? Because there *is* hunger in western North Carolina — right here in our own neighborhood, in fact. Some of the hungriest children identified at neighboring Jones Elementary School take home bags of food packed on Thursdays by parishioners at Grace. In just the half hour or so it takes to pack those bags, the Grace Backpackers, in partnership with MANNA Food Bank, make it a little less likely that a child will go hungry over the weekend.

This was a big jump! I served in most of these capacities for ten years.

At twenty I became a father! Jonah was born and I began to understand, as feeble as it was, another dimension of love our God has for us as Heavenly Father. Four years later Ellie was born! These have been the two greatest gifts and joys of my life! A little over a year later my father passed away from cancer, I was going through a divorce, and my family, as we knew it, was gone. I took some time apart from everyone to examine the direction in which I should go. Where was I being called?

As I passed the majestic Grace Church upon the hill day by day, I wondered what was the inside like? What were the people like? One Sunday I decided to go and see. Wow! Truly a light on the hill. What a wonderful place full of the presence of God! What a balm for the soul that Grace offered to me and my family. I was home! I am so glad God led us to the Grace Parish! Your Vestry

Pledge receipts of \$28,762 in October brought year-to-date pledges to \$294,764 compared to budgeted pledges of \$299,169. Considering all other income sources, income for the first ten months totaled \$370,766, resulting in a negative variance of (\$7,916).

The negative income variance for the first ten months was offset by under budget Mission & Outreach costs of \$8,432, under budget Operations costs of \$8,128 and under budget Personnel costs of \$13,860. These positive variances total \$30,420, but this number is reduced somewhat by over-budget expenses of \$2,277 in Parish Programs, giving us total savings from budgeted expenses of \$28,143. When applied to the negative income variance of (\$7,916) and adjusted for suspended costs of \$480, year-to-date income less expenses at the end of October totaled \$19,747.

We are prayerful as we continue toward year-end that all needs will be met with continued offerings.
