Dear People of Grace,

As I am writing this on November 22; there are only thirty-two more shopping days until Christmas. That's the bad news. The good news is Advent begins this coming Sunday, November 27. Why is that good news? It is good news because Advent gives us some holy space during the busyness of the holiday season. Let's face it. Some of the busyness is probably unavoidable in our culture. There are special gatherings with family and friends which will involve food shopping and preparation. Most of us also have some Christmas shopping to do for family and friends. Some of us, (God bless you and keep you safe!) will be traveling during the holidays. Even if only some of this applies to you, it is apt to speed your life up so that Christmas, even the twelve days of Christmas, could come and go in a blur.

But, we Christ followers have a chance to step out of the flow of all the busyness by being intentional about meeting with God regularly during Advent. Some of us will make family Advent wreaths this coming Sunday, November 27, in the parish hall at 10:00 a.m. At that time, we will receive a booklet with a simple little daily service for Advent. But, whether you have an Advent wreath or not, you can light a candle or candles at your table each night symbolizing the light of Jesus that has come into the world and remained with us. As the days get shorter and the physical darkness of night encroaches upon our days, it is a blessing to light candles which always dispel

the darkness as Christ always dispels our spiritual darkness. If you need the simple Advent table worship service booklet, just call us at the church office and we will get one to you.

Our four Sundays of Advent worship will serve as weekly stepping stones to the celebration of the Incarnation of God and the Nativity of our Lord Jesus, which begins with our first Christmas Eve service at 4:00 p.m., the annual Children's Paper Bag Pageant. Any child can come at 3:30 p.m. that day and we will provide him or her with a costume for the pageant. Then, with the help of our children, we will see the Christmas Story reenacted before our very eyes.

Then, in the evening, we will hear and sing the familiar carols from 9:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and celebrate the Christ-mass both at the 10:00 p.m. worship service that evening and at the 10:00 a.m. service on Christmas Day.

As that great carol says so beautifully, "Let every heart prepare Him room!" I wish you quality time with God during the Season of Advent as we watch and wait for the celebration of the holiest event of all time when God chose to come and be one of us, so that we could behold the very face of God firsthand in the face of His Son Jesus.

"For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and He is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6)

Diocesan Convention Report

It was a great honor for Shannon and me to serve as Grace Church's lay delegates to the 95th Convention of the Diocese of Western North Carolina. Equal parts legislative assembly, corporate worship, breakout sessions, and family reunion, Convention gave us an opportunity to connect with Episcopalians from across the Diocese of Western North Carolina, to reunite with old friends, and to make new ones. While this Convention did not address any major or controversial issues, we did name the eight lay and eight clergy delegates to represent the Diocese at General Convention in 2018 in Austin, Texas.

What made this Convention especially exciting was the presence of our new bishop, José McLoughlin. I believe we're going to find his leadership very engaging and action-oriented. As Convention opened, Kanuga lay under a blanket of haze from the wildfires burning throughout our area. Of especial concern was the Lake Lure fire, and the evacuation of the communities of Lake Lure, Chimney Rock, and Bat Cave. Absent from Convention was the rector of the Church of the Transfiguration in Bat Cave, Wes Shields (whom many of us may remember from his time with us over the past few years), as he was helping with the fire-control efforts in his community. At one point, the church itself (and Wes's house) was in the evacuation zone and looked to be in peril. Throughout Saturday, Bishop McLoughlin

kept one eye on Twitter, communicating with Wes and with Episcopal Relief and Development. By the end of Saturday's session, he had secured funding from ERD for parishes in the Diocese to assist community members affected by the fires. How cool is that!

The Bishop also demonstrated his commitment to the youth of the Diocese through actions and words. Youth leaders played prominent roles in our corporate worship, reading lessons and delivering the homilies at Friday's Evening Prayer and Saturday's Morning Prayer services. Moreover, the Bishop challenged each parish to send two more children to Camp Henry each summer, declaring that money will not be the reason a child can't attend, even if he has to dig into his own pockets!

Convention ended with the Eucharist on Sunday. In his sermon, Bishop McLoughlin called on each of us to do the work the Kingdom of God requires: working for peace and justice as a healing and loving presence in our communities. This is how we are to "Walk in the Way, Widen the Walls, and Wake up the World!"

Christmas Reflection from the Atria. Now the waiting has come to an end! After weeks of looking at an empty manger waiting for the Christ child, the Season of Christmas has come! Reflect on what this child could do. What changes will He bring? The anticipation has been building. . . Finally! He has come! This is what the young child has been preparing for. The time to place the babe into the manger. When you read the scripture about that wondrous holy occasion, you do not need to teach it! Nor, do you have to have all the answers. Simply guide the conversations. Allow the words to settle in their hearts as well as yours, and ponder with Mary the divinity and humanity that have met in the Christ child. Allow imaginations to roam the hillside, to see the shepherds, and consider the greeting from the heavenly host. Allow questions to rise: What was Mary feeling? What did Joseph think? How would I have reacted to the Angels with their glad tidings? Why did God choose such a birth for His Son? Have

an open discussion and listen to their thoughts. You may be surprised! Examine the Holy Scriptures with them. Grant the freedom to look at Christmas as a young Christian through new eyes, and love His celebration of incarnation.

Newcomers: The Importance of Greeters

The following is an excerpt from the book Welcome by Andrew D. Weeks, shared by Joyce Noble

Q. Why do you put so much emphasis on the role of greeters?

R. Greeters are our front line "troops," welcoming God's guests. Experienced greeters are able to recognize visitors by their body language and unfamiliar faces and are prepared to respond to their needs and questions. Greeters are trained to offer simple directions about seating, the order of worship, and the prayer books, Bibles, or hymnals used in the service. When someone has made the effort to visit, the very least they deserve is to be recognized and respected. This personal touch and readiness is powerful; I know from my own experience because it was the attention and warmth of just one man that drew me into the church.

In 1980 I visited a church for purely social reasons. The elderly man who greeted me made it abundantly clear that my presence there had made it more special for him, and he invited me to return, assuring me that he would be there for me if I did. As the week passed I remembered his smile, I began to realize that I wanted to return, just to see the look on his face! So I did, and it was worth it.

The mere presence of someone dedicated to serving visitors will deliver the message that your church is truly a welcoming place.

So greeting is not just saying hello, shuffling visitors off to a pew, and then forgetting about them. Greeting requires responsibility, asking, "How can I serve you?" This is not easy; it requires courage to ask someone "What can I do to serve you?" They may dump a torrent of sorrow at you, or they may freeze at the intrusion. But serving visitors means receiving them into our hearts; it is a deliberate decision to care for these persons, for whatever time and at whatever depth they require at the moment we encounter them. It means ensuring that visitors will never be alone, physically or spiritually.

The first time I really took responsibility for a newcomer, I tried to comfort a crying young woman who was sitting alone in the back pew after the service. I had absolutely no idea what to do; I am not a trained counselor. But could not ignore her distress. So, I sat down and waited for her aloneness. I invited her to coffee hour. To my surprise, she accepted and was gracious and warm with those she met.

Postscript: Today she is a member, attending every week with her husband, and her two children are in Sunday school. She also has introduced her best friend to the church and she and her child are now regulars. So from my small, awkward effort, three adults and three children are now in community with us. This stuff works!

Outreach

The **Angel Tree** is up in the foyer. This year we are partnering with Caring for Children and the foster parents to help provide presents for Christmas for children who are unable to live with their birth families (usually because of abuse or neglect). You may take an angel from the tree. Please buy as many of the items listed on the angel as you want to purchase and return the items to the church. You do NOT have to buy everything on the lists. These are wishes and you would not give your own child everything he or she wishes for, so please treat these children the same. Make sure the angel is returned with the presents so that we may get the right presents to the child who asked for them. You may wrap the presents if you want to, but it is not necessary since there are volunteers who will do it. If you wrap the presents, please put a post-it note on each present saying what is in it so that the person who is caring for the child will know what it is. We would like to suggest that you find a friend with whom to "share" an angel or two and a fun time shopping together. If you want to make a monetary donation but not shop, please call SueThompkins at 828-230-9328, or email her at susan.thompkins@gmail.com. If you are planning to do this, you must do this before Monday, December 5th since Sue is leaving town and will not be able to shop for you after that week. **PRESENTS ARE DUE BACK AT THE CHURCH NO LATER THAN SUNDAY, DECEMBER 18.** We hope you have a blessed Christmas and are so grateful for your support of this project.

Pledge receipts through the end of October totaled \$292,533 compared to projected pledges of \$274,167. Considering all income sources, income received to date totaled \$361,002; while we projected income to be \$335,377. We ended the month with another positive income variance of \$25,624. Even considering a large donation received early in the year, we are still experiencing a very positive trend in pledged income.

The positive income variance thus far was reduced somewhat by expenses which were slightly greater than budgeted amounts by \$747. When subtracted from the positive income variance of \$25,624 our income less expenses resulted in a still healthy surplus of \$24,877 thus far in the year.

While we proceeded this year in a very positive manner, we do need to be aware

that a single donation has greatly influenced our financial position. We continue to encourage prayer and attention to our stewardship efforts.
